Expert tip Describe your past employment using bullet points that state what you did at each job. If you're having trouble describing these details, try the STAR method: this stands for Situation, Task, Action and Result. What situations were you placed in? What tasks did you face? What action/approach did you take to achieve the best result?Remember to stay brief in your descriptions, however. That's why it's important to keep positive relationships with families you've worked for – they serve as references and they help you fill out your employment history section. Here are some areas to consider when breaking down your previous role as a babysitter, nanny or childcare worker: In what setting did you care for the children? How many children did you routinely take care of and what were their ages? At what times did you take care of the children? Did you live with the family? What additional household or extra tasks did you complete? Did the parents give you any extra responsibilities like overnight care or a family vacation? In any case, if you have this type of education, it's a good idea to list it on your resume. When looking for a babysitting job, it's fine to list a non-related degree-in-progress to communicate to parents that you are a responsible and motivated student who has already shown commitment in other areas of your life. There's also another advantage of advanced certifications and education – a pay boost. In fact, they only spend an average of seven seconds before deciding if a candidate is worth reading more about.This is where your resume summary comes into play. This is a brief, 2-4 sentence paragraph nested into your resume's header. It summarizes who you are as a babysitter and what you can offer.Depending on how much work experience you have, you can write a resume summary or a resume objective.Here are some key differences:Resume summary. For seasoned babysitters, a resume summary is where it's at. It provides a snapshot of your extensive experience, primary babysitting skills, and accomplishments in the field.Resume objective. If you're a budding babysitter, use a resume objective instead. This emphasizes your babysitting-related skills, relevant experiences, and your motivation for the job.Here's an example of an experienced babysitter's resume summary:Dedicated and nurturing babysitter, seeking a position with Family Y. Driven to make a positive impact on children's early developmental stages.Even without tons of experience, you can have a great resume objective that shows families you're the right person for the job.Babysitters are different from nannies. While nannies can be live-in family assistants who help with childrearing and household management, babysitters are usually part-time, work on short notice, and require less experience.The work experience section of your babysitter resume is what the hiring manager's going to look at first, so you have to make sure it's formatted correctly.Here's how:List jobs reverse-chronologically. Start with your most recent babysitting role and work your way back.Add employer details. Include the family's last name and location. If privacy is a concern, you can use "Private Family in Billings" or something similar. If you worked through an agency, you can just add the agency's name and location instead.Provide the dates. Use the mm/yyyy format so hiring managers can easily see your tenure.List responsibilities and achievements. Use 5-6 bullet points for your most recent positions, while older roles should only get 2-3 points.But that's just the formatting.If you want your work experience to really impress a potential employer, you have to go the extra mile.Let's talk about how you can take this section to the next level:Tailor your work experience to the job. The role and the responsibilities you list should match the job. Your time tutoring your younger siblings this year is more relevant than your gig delivering pizza five years ago.Focus on achievements over responsibilities. Employers probably know what your past responsibilities were since they're looking for you to do the same thing. Instead, impress them by showing the impact of your work so they know what they can expect you to do for them.Quantify when you can. Numbers are great for credibility. For example, "Babysat three kids regularly" doesn't quite hit the mark like "Consistently cared for a family of three children over two years, maintaining a safe and stimulating environment".Choose powerful verbs. Every babysitter has "looked after" or "watched," and it's boring. Instead, use words like "cared for," "mentored," or "guided" to give your resume a punch and show you as a proactive babysitter, not someone who stands idly by. If you're still enrolled, you can specify your expected graduation date. (E.g. class of 2023)Minimalistic, right?Just list your latest degree and work your way further back. While certifications are optional, this is probably the best thing you can add to your babysitting resume. Anything related to safety, like First Aid or CPR, and any official babysitting certifications can significantly boost your odds of getting an interview.Personal projects. If you write children's books or create DIY games, this is the perfect place to highlight your passion, creativity, and resourcefulness.Languages. Being fluent in more than one language can be a huge bonus and open you up to job opportunities in multilingual households or those looking for language tutors.Hobbies and interests. Sharing your hobbies can offer families a glimpse into your personality. Add your contact information to your cover letter and match it with the information on your resume. Make sure to add the family or hiring manager's contact information on your cover letter, too.Greet the reader by name. If you're applying for a job directly with the family, skip "Dear Sir/Madam" and refer to them by name. If you're applying for an agency, do a bit of research to find out the hiring manager's name, and do the same.Write a strong opening statement. Your cover letter should start with an attention-grabbing paragraph. Include why you're writing and what some of your top skills, achievements, or qualifications are.Expand in the body of your text. Go into more detail about what you have to offer the employer. Explain a few of your top achievements or skills and how they relate to what you can do.Wrap it up with the right closing line. When finishing up your letter, invite the hiring manager to take some sort of action, and follow it with an appropriate closing line and your name.
